Cultural Funding by Government—2020–21

Queensland Government

The estimate of expenditure funded by the Queensland Government in 2020–21 for cultural activities was **\$506.7m**. This represented an increase of 13% or \$56.5m from 2019–20. This amount includes **\$43.0m** of targeted COVID support funding for cultural and creative organisations and infrastructure, businesses, individuals, support programs and initiatives.



- Recurrent expenses accounted for 80% (\$404.8m) of funded cultural expenditure.
- Capital expenditure was \$101.9m, and the largest two categories were *Performing arts venues* (\$68.5m) and *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$14.4m).
- The estimate of per person cultural funding was \$97.57.

Funds for Total Heritage activities (recurrent and capital) fell 5% (or \$13.0m) to \$240.1m.

This decrease was driven by less expenditure on the categories of *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\downarrow \$5.6m) and *Art museums* (\downarrow \$5.5m), due to the completion of capital works.

The largest categories of *Heritage* expenditure were *Libraries* \$86.2m, followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* with \$74.9m.





Funds for Total Arts activities (recurrent and capital) rose 35% (or \$69.5m) to \$266.6m.



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The main contributors to this increase were *Performing arts venues* \uparrow \$43.2m, *Cross-art form* \uparrow \$12.9m (both due to capital investment) and *Music* \uparrow \$5.5m. Funding for *Film and video production and distribution* dropped \$7.0m.






Performing arts venues (\$117.4m) accounted for over one-third (or 44%) of all funded expenditure by the Queensland Government on *Arts* activities.


Other main categories of Arts activities funding were:

- Arts education—\$43.7m
- Cross-art form—\$16.3m
- *Music*—\$14.0m
- Film and video production and distribution—\$12.3m
- Visual arts and crafts—\$10.2m.

Total recurrent expenditure rose 8% (or \$30.9m) to \$404.8m.

The largest recurrent expenditure was for *Libraries* \$82.8m, followed by *Other museums and cultural heritage* (\$60.5m) and *Art museums* (\$56.4m).





The largest recurrent dollar increase was for the category of Other museums and cultural heritage \$\$\phi\$6.9m between 2019-20 and 2020-21.
