#### The Centrality of the Artist

Youth Arts Practitioners for eons have been more than artists: in increasingly secular times, they have carefully held the cultural wellbeing of young people throughout childhood and adolescence. In the age of covid, remote learning, exponential cases of mental ill-health, we have been caretakers of young people in profound ways. The arts has been a lifeline for radical numbers of children and teenagers: offering connection, sanctuary, self-learning, escapism, risk-taking within safe contexts, vulnerability, kinship to kindred spirits, acceptance, encouragement, motivation, access to story and narrative, interpretation and understanding. With school refusal at record highs, disturbing levels of anxiety, self-harm, suicidal ideation, and social media addiction, theatre and creative services for young people has been their salvation. And more than just respite, it has offered powerful re-routing: steering young people towards learning, re-engagement, relationships, productivity, and making cultural contributions. The work done by youth arts practitioners is comprehensive. It is tireless, fearless, and based on a respect and celebration for the role of the young human in a progressive and equitable society.

### **Reaching the Audience**

Stories are for everybody. Culture is for everybody. Arts are for everybody. This sector needs the funding, support, and recognition so it's normalised as an everyday/every week part of people's lives: not elite, not an exception, not a sometimes food.
