First Nations

At GML Heritage we completely agree with this goal as a fundamental pillar of Australian culture. We First Nations see history and heritage as integral to culture wholistically, not just arts practice. We acknowledge the rights and interests of First Nations people and believe they are the rightful owners of their culture.

We believe that acknowledgement, better recognition, and protection of First Nations cultural heritage will contribute to improved health and wellbeing, as well as healing and the journey to reconciliation. The destruction of the irreplaceable ancient caves by Rio Tinto at Juukan Gorge is a case in point, where Traditional owners were left bereft by the cultural harm.

We feel that an honest reckoning with our history, confronting the difficult truths, will help strengthen Australia's unique cultural identity and contribute to <u>inclusion and greater civic</u> <u>empathic</u>. This will take strength and courage but ultimately work towards improved awareness and appreciation.

Like most things, this pillar comes with challenges and opportunities. Respectful engagement with is crucial, as is support for community-based research to build the archive of knowledge and information about our history and heritage, various aspects of which have long been silenced or marginalised. A more intricate and sophisticated concept of culture is an opportunity. Just defining the 'culture' as an abstract noun through artistic activity is no longer sufficient to stimulate our symbolic and material systems of production, recognition and representation.

A Place for Every Story

We support this pillar and see Australia's continuous living history and heritage as a key ingredient of culture and identity. Country, landscape, and places are deeply storied through human occupation and experience from deep time to the present. Nature has its own agency and this needs to be integral to placing stories. Stories are diverse and the perspectives on places can enhance our appreciation and understanding of human experience through time. History and heritage can provide instructive insights into how people
